In Memoriam: Fr. Francis M. Clifford

3/20/1928 - 3/7/2009

A large number of faithful Catholics have lost a great friend and a loyal priest with the death of Fr. Francis M. Clifford on March 7, 2009. Heartbroken with the ruin of the Faith on all sides, Father never wavered from his fidelity to his priestly vows. He never turned (as countless others had) away from his God in the Blessed Sacrament, to whom he gave the entirety of his life. The attraction of the Holy Eucharist was his vocation, his ecclesiastical spirit, his sanctity, and his very joy.

To Fr. Clifford, the Sacred Host, the queen of all Catholic devotions, was the most supreme of all God's mercies — and, at the same time, the very extension of the Incarnation. The presence of the Eternal Word made man in the Sacrament of the altar was the greatest Gift that God could confer upon the world. To this Gift, Father gave his life.

The great warmth of his other devotions was enkindled by his love for the Incarnate Word. He was tireless in propagating devotion to the Heart of Jesus; to each person he met, from the waitress at the restaurant to the toll taker on the Garden State Parkway, he gave a badge of the Sacred Heart. Each year, in July, Father trekked northward on a pilgrimage to the Shrine of Sainte Anne de Beaupré, to honor the mother of the Mother of God. He was profoundly devoted to the Passion of Our Lord and to the Stations of the Cross, which he had learned at the side of his father, at St. Patrick's Church in Nashua, New Hampshire.

Who will ever forget the moment of Consecration in Father's Mass, when, as Father leaned over the bread and the wine, all time seemed to cease at that most profound of moments — the moment when the "Compendium of all Miracles," Transubstantiation, took place at the hands of a humble priest. Fr. Clifford knew well that the priesthood was created for the Holy Eucharist and that his greatest honor and privilege was to draw Our Lord down from His Heaven, each morning at Mass.

To Father's great priestly loyalty and fidelity to the parishioners of St. Anthony of Padua Church in North Caldwell, we will be forever grateful. May the priestly soul of Fr. Francis Clifford, and all the souls of the faithful departed, rest in peace. Amen.

From the Pastor's Desk: The First Seven Years (Part 3)

A child's true spirit of piety comes from the parents

The love of piety does not come suddenly. When St. Dominic Savio was three, his parents were in the habit of putting him to bed before saying the rosary. When children are put to bed that way, they do not like it. They get the impression that they are being rid of, that something interesting is going to happen; perhaps dad and mom are going to eat chocolate cream. What do adults do when the children are in bed? One evening, therefore, St. Dominic got up in pajamas and stood behind his parents who were piously saying their rosary. His father discovered him after a while and pretended to put him back to bed. Little Dominic resisted and asked to remain until the end. This example shows the importance in religious education that one must attach to the sincere prayers of parents. When the child sees or senses his parents praying sincerely, he will imitate them, for a child naturally loves truth, integrity, and sincerity. The aim is to give him a natural habit of daily prayer so that, one day, he comes to love praying.

In the house of St. Therese's birth, in Alencon, one can see the bed of the Martins, her parents. When Therese was small, she liked to hide at the foot of this bed, behind the curtain that comes down from the ceiling. There, she "thought of God, of the swiftness of life, of eternity." There was a little girl who, at a very young age, knew how to pray because she was immersed in a profoundly Christian atmosphere.

The lives of saints are filled with these wonderful examples that help us greatly to understand those principles of religious education essential to our supernatural life. Their writings and their actions support in a very clear fashion what we have explained above.

During the absorbing age, a child is naturally more attracted to piety

St. Therese understood very well the importance of the "absorbing age." Before entering Carmel, she took into her home two very young girls whose mother had just died, and took care of them all day. Concerning this subject, she wrote: "I saw rapidly that Holy Baptism disposes in souls a profound seed of theological virtues. When I wanted to see my two little girls be agreeable to each other, instead of promising toys or candy, I spoke to them of eternal rewards ... Seeing those innocent souls so closely, I understood what a shame it would be not to form them upon their awak-

ening, when they resemble soft wax ... How many souls would reach sanctity, if they were well directed!"

Great importance of the first catechism of the mother

The history of St. Pius X's decree on early communion (August 8, 1910) is very instructive on the importance of parents giving to the little ones a proper catechism. St. Pius X asked himself if he should allow little children to receive communion as soon as they are able to distinguish the Holy Eucharist from ordinary bread. As was his habit, according to Cardinal Merry Del Val, he asked God to clarify the subject. "My Lord, tell me what must I do." He repeated this often. One day, it was announced that an English lady and a boy of four were soliciting an audience. It is not usually easy to be received by the pope, but St. Pius X responded with eagerness, and the mother and her boy were introduced. While the mother conversed with the Holy Father, the child approached and put his hands on the Pope's knees. "John!" exclaimed the dismayed mother.

"Let him be," said St. Pius X. "My little one, you have something to say to me. I know it, do not be afraid."

The child exclaimed, in a single breath, "Holy Father, I would like to do my First Communion."

He asked, "Whom does one receive in Holy Communion?" "Jesus Christ."

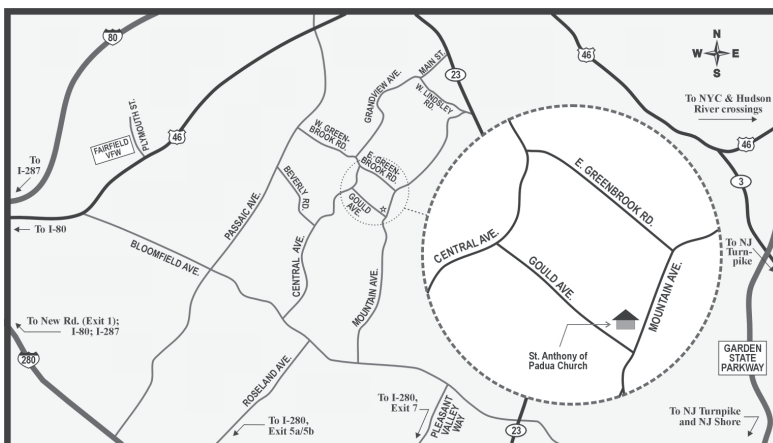
"And who is Jesus Christ?"

"Jesus Christ is the Son of God."

The answer shot like a cannonball from the child. St. Pius X got up and said, "Madam, bring the child to me tomorrow, here, at 6 a.m. I will give him Holy Communion myself, in my private chapel. My little one, you will not wait one more day." The pope of the Holy Eucharist received his answer; it was not the only time in Church history that God spoke to his representatives through the mouths of children.

God, who loves candor and innocence, sent His response to the Saint, through the mouth of a four-year-old. He, Who knows perfectly "how the man is done," showed us by examples that it is during the absorbing age that the human being receives the foundation of his spiritual life. It is during infancy that the child learns to speak to God sincerely by prayer. In this short part of human life, man gets the deep spirit of Christian piety that will follow him all his life. Let us imitate in our families these beautiful examples of the saints, to obtain blessings and vocations in our flourishing parish.

From US-46 (east of Willowbrook Mall):

US-46W to NJ-23S. Right on Lindsley Rd. Left on Mountain Ave. Right to 103 Gould Ave.

From US-46 (west of Willowbrook Mall, #1):

US-46E to NJ-23S. Right on Lindsley Rd. Left on Mountain Ave. Right to 103 Gould Ave.

From US-46 (west of Willowbrook Mall, #2):

US-46E to Bloomfield Ave. Right on Bloomfield Ave. Left on Mountain Ave. Left to 103 Gould Ave.

From I-280 (option #1):

Exit 5a or 5b to Livingston Ave (northbound). Right on Eagle Rock Ave. Left on Roseland Ave. Right on Bloomfield Ave. Left on Mountain Ave. Left to 103 Gould Ave.

From I-280 (option #2):

Exit 7 to Pleasant Valley Way (northbound). Left on Bloomfield Ave. Right on Mountain Ave. Left to 103 Gould Ave.

From NJ-23 (southbound):

NJ-23S, past Willowbrook Mall and Wayne Towne Center. Right on Lindsley Rd. Left on Mountain Ave. Right to 103 Gould Ave.

From NJ-23 (northbound):

Left on Lindsley Rd. Left on Mountain Ave. Right to 103 Gould Ave.

From I-80 (eastbound):

Exit 47B (The Caldwells/Montclair) to US-46E. Right on Bloomfield Ave. Left on Mountain Ave. Left to 103 Gould Ave.

From I-80 (westbound):

Exit 53 to NJ-23S. Right on Lindsley Rd. Left on Mountain Ave. Right to 103 Gould Ave.

From I-287:

I-287 to NJ-23 or I-80, whichever is closer. Follow directions as above for NJ-23 southbound or I-80 eastbound.
